Introduction:

The Nilgiris Adivasi Welfare Association (NAWA) is a registered, charitable Non-Governmental organisation working solely for the welfare and development of tribal communities of Nilgiris and its surrounding areas. It was founded in 1952 by Dr. S. Narasimhan following his many years of lonely pioneering work.

Dr. S. Narasimhan, who settled in Kotagiri after his graduation in Medicine, became very concerned about the plight of the tribal communities around Kotagiri. He was called by a Kurumba man one night to help his wife, who was struggling to deliver a child. Dr. Narasimhan trekked through the inhospitable jungle, against the advice of his friends, with the Kurumba man and reached a place, where several Kurumba families were living under a huge boulder. He helped the woman to deliver the baby. Dr. Narasimhan was greatly moved by this incident and took an oath, then, that he would devote rest of his life for the cause of the tribal people. Thus began the Movement.

Dr. Narasimhan won the confidence of the people at a time when they lost their home lands and were highly suspicious of outsiders. The trust and goodwill created by him is the basis for all the work that is being carried out by NAWA even today.

He went on to establish hospitals, dispensaries, mobile clinics, balwdis and the rehabilitation farm for formerly bonded Paniya tribe. District Collectors, Chief Ministers, Governors of the State Government recognized Dr. Narasimhan and offered help. Former and First Prime Minister of India presented a Jeep for his medical work. A movement that was set in motion by Doctor is being carried on, now, by a dedicated team of Professionals.

In 1966 Miss Victoria Armstrong (Inspector of School in England) Inspired by Dr. Narasimhan's work joined Nilgiris Adivasi Welfare Association as a voluntary worker. She became the Honorary Treasurer of Nilgiris Adivasi Welfare Association and under her leadership the work of NAWA expanded to cover more villages with many new programmes.

Ever since the formation of NAWA the focus of work has been in the fields of health and education. Gradually significant importance was also given to social and economic development, integration of various tribal communities, net working and liaison with other agencies for integrated tribal development.

Activities of NAWA:

- Medical and health care is provided through hospitals, day dispensaries, mobile medical service with the support of Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Government of India.
- NAWA in partnership with National Health Mission (NHN), Tamil Nadu Government provide medical and health care assistance under Tribal Mobile Outreach Service (TMORS) in four blocks of the Nilgiris District and 2 blocks in Coimbatore District.
- Sickle cell anaemia screening and intervention such as medical support and counselling with the support of National Health Mission (NHN) in the Nilgiris and Coimbatore Districts.
- Mother and child care is provided through crèche programme grant-aided by Ministry of Women and Child Welfare through ICDS.
- Education and economic development programme through child sponsorship programme supported by ChildFund India.
- Higher Education support with assistance from the Nilgiris Adivasi Trust and Muendel Atherstone Scholarship Trust Fund.
- Livelihood and economic development programmes with the support of various Government and Non Government agencies.
- Promotion of herbal gardens and medicines and training of young men and women on preparation and use of herbal medicines.
- Networking with Government and Non Government agencies for resource mobilisation for tribal development in the region.
- Promotion of tribal artefacts such as Toda embroidery, Kota pottery, Kurumba painting and support for value addition to minor forest produces.
- Promotion of Heritage centres highlighting tribal culture, literature and tourism.
- Primary School providing English medium education of tribal and other children.
- Community College – Affiliated to Barathiyar University offering one year Diploma courses.
- Childline sub-centres supported by Ministry of Women and Child Development working for child protection and safety.
- Education and environment programmes to address climate changes.

Services provided to children, pregnant and lactating mother at the crèche centres are a furnished below:

Nutritional supplement mix provided in the morning, Milk provided in the forenoon

Tomato rice, green rice, tamarind rice, coconut rice and vegetables are provided as lunch randomly

Routine medical check-up is conducted for the children and mothers. BMI (Body Mass Index) for the children is also conducted every month and suitable food and medicines are also provided to both mother and child.

Registers such as attendance register for child and staff, stock register, register for pregnant and lactating mothers, village birth and death registers, admission register, medical examination register, details of procurement of goods locally and visitor's registers are maintained at each crèche.

CHILDLINE works with Allied organizations such as District Social Welfare Officer, Police, District Child Protection Unit, Child Welfare Committee, Juvenile Justice Board, Revenue, Departments of Health, Labour Welfare and Education.

This year around 407 children were benefited. 273 children are under the age of 6 to 14 years, 134 children under the age of 15 to 24 years. 137 children were granted a sum of Rs. 107,000/- to support their education. Apart from this 69 children were coached and provided Rs. 45,000 worth educational materials to aid them to embark upon the competitive recruitment exams conducted by government for various government jobs.

NAWA COMMUNITY COLLEGE

NAWA Community College started in the year 2015, recognized and affiliated with Bharathiar University Coimbatore to empower the disadvantaged and under privileged youth by offering various courses which would secure them employment and lead to a better standard of life.



During 2018-19 III batch of two courses in one year Diploma in Health Assistance and Naturopathy courses were conducted for 34 and 26 students respectively.

This year we also started One year Diploma in Health Assistance course at Paniya Farm and 20 students are studying at present.

Regular classes are conducted in both the centres and 60 students are going to write the University Examination and 10 students are going to write NAWA Certificate Examination.

Among this 70 students 43 students are from Tribal community.

Next year Plan:

We are planning to conduct Diploma in Traditional Medicine, Diploma in Tribal studies, Diploma in Forest Management and Diploma in Forest & Eco Tourism. We are aiming to enroll around 100 students.

Our Success:

In the last academic year 2017-18 (II batch) 22 students appeared for the university exam and all are successfully passed out in the exams.



REJUVENATION OF TRADITIONAL TRIBAL HERBAL MEDICAL PRACTICES

This project has been implemented around the most of the tribal villages in the Kotagiri Block under the supervision of unit head Mr. Rajkumar, Director Resources and 12 other Field Staff, mainly focusing to reinstate the traditional medicines practices among tribes and general public.

The team intervenes to every tribal village around Kotagiri block and provides training for the tribal peoples especially youngsters to promote traditional medicine practice for curing illness like Anaemia, fever, cold, cough, headache, joint pains, etc.



This year 13 types of herbal medicine were produced. On the other hand, we have planned to join hands with Foundation for Revitalization of Local Health Traditions (FRLHT), Bangalore to take this project even further.

PANIYA REHABILITATION FARM COLONY (PRF)

The Paniya rehabilitation farm colony started in 1965 and has progressed steadily. 65 acres of tea estate, pepper and areca nut tree is being maintained.

Progress of the farm during the year -

- Local management committee meet once a month and monitors the functioning of the Farm.
- Pruned 6 acres of tea plant.
- Fertilisation and weeding was done for the tea farm.
- Obtained subsidy from the government for renovating the roof of 22 houses at Pothukolli tribal village.
- With the help of government green house project 3 houses are under construction for 3 tribal families.
- A building worth 22 lakhs was allotted by the government for gathering agriculture seeds.
- 2 Paniya students were assisted to obtain free admission at Nilgiris College at Thalur
- Under NAWA Community College 19 students are admitted and attending classes regularly.
- A total of 68,861 Kgs of tea leaf was harvested this year.
- Old age pension for 10 individuals and Community Certificates for 36 individuals were obtained from the government and benefited
